really good CW operators is dwindling both from advancing age and the dropping of the code requirements for licensing. Slower ops can make a significant contribution and add to the fellowship of these events. It is far better to have two ops taking turns at, say, 15 wpm than no ops at 30+. This note is to encourage tasting the CW waters and to become aware of various learning options.

First, a few words on the advantages of CW (I will ignore any disadvantages for now!):

- You can operate and have fun with a head cold or laryngitis.
- You can operate at midnight and not wake the wife or kids.
- You can (with practice) get intelligence out of a very small piece of RF spectrum.
- You can get awe and respect from those unwilling to even try.
- You can get fame, honor and glory by helping your club or group win their category.
- You can critique movies with phoney morse messages.
- You can be a 'hired gun' and operate from exotic locations. DXpeditions always need top notch CW operators.
- You can analyze the propagation path mentally as the tonal character of the sent message is known. (backscatter, multipathing, auroral flutter, etc.).

There are more! Jump in and swim a bit!

In somewhat of a turnabout, several organizations have formed recently to encourage and provide tutelage in CW. I am aware of FISTS, SKCC, and CWops. There may be others. I personally was (am?) a member of FISTS and more recently of CWops. I am personally not acquainted with SKCC (see Carl, he is) FISTS is aimed at a relatively slow operating style while CWops (membership, at least) is for the faster set. Membership is by nomination for good operating style and at speeds of at least 25 wpm.

New Business

Don Bennett, KG7BP announced that the recent testing session resulted in 17 people getting licenses or upgrades. There were 2 Extra- Class, 5 General, and 10 Technicians. Curt Hadley, KF7VZV, said there were 17 students attending the current Technician/General licensing class. These classes are held at the Smullin Center on Sundays from 2 to 5 pm.

Treasurer's Report

Bob Deuel, K2GLO, reported a balance of \$3470.20 in the club treasury.

The meeting was put on hold at 1932 L for "eyeball QSOs" and coffee. The meeting was called back into session at 2000 L Presentation. Lud Sibley, KB2EVN took us back a hundred years and the technology that was in use during that era, with a presentation on Victorian Technology. This is a centennial year for two different landmark events, the first transcontinental telephone service, and the start of radio telephony across the Atlantic. Lud described the development of techniques used, and the obstacles that had to be overcome for long distance landline telephone operations. He also described the first stations used for trans-Atlantic radio telephone operations.

CWops was formed some years back by a great group of CW ops. They are generally contesters but include many rag chewers. A main emphasis of CWops is to take that experience set and use it to help others with the CW art. CWops has created several programs to help others improve their speed and usage of CW. First out was their CW academy program which pairs a mentee with an on the air mentor. More recently is their advisor on the air program. Follows is an extract from a recent CWops newsletter asking for more advisors and a summary of current activity in that program.

Weekly Highlights: This past week was our first week for CWA HF. The CWAHF Advisors will match the sending speed of the calling station. We are using 20 wpm character speed and adding sufficient spacing to drop the overall speed down as necessary. We can be identified on 7.035 by the 'CWA' at the end of our transmissions. Check the CWA HF calendar for available advisors and times.

Rob, K6RB is the President of CWops and also one of our volunteer HF Advisors. K6RB has many interests, one of which is restoring and maintaining vintage radio gear. Rob is using his vintage Globe King500/75A-4 station on CWA HF.

Cap, W0CCA can be heard Fridays at 0300 (UTC) introducing the 'Bug Practice time' hour. Cap is an accomplished Bug user and was keying his beloved Frattini J36 this last week. Of course Cap has many more Bugs in his collection and will bring out a different one each week.

Joe, N3HEE is on several times a week (check the calendar for times) and besides being a very accomplished operator, offers a unique opportunity for all stations that work him. N3HEE has a live You tube connection going while he is in QSO and you can watch the video after you QSO with Joe. This allows an opportunity to hear how you sound live on the air, and from time to time, N3HEE even provides commentary on the QSO (or is he just talking to himself out loud? You decide!).
